DELEGATIONS & GUESTS:

Darrell Gunn, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure – Shift Into Winter Campaign Mayor Leclerc welcomed Darrell Gunn of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) to the Council Meeting.

Mr. Gunn addressed Council. The Shift Into Winter Driving Alliance was created in 2006 and began advertising the Shift Into Winter Campaign in the Northwest region last year. The founding members of the Shift Into Winter Driving Alliance are WorkSafeBC, MoTl, the Insurance Council of British Columbia (ICBC), and the Justice Institute.

The Shift Into Winter Driving Alliance was formed because of the influx of motor vehicle accidents due to seasonal changes. The increase of seasonal motor vehicle accidents is frequently due to snow, less daylight hours, increased fog, increased rain, and black ice.

This campaign focuses on preparing oneself and ones vehicle for winter driving, as well as preparing for driving trips during the winter season.

The Shift Into Winter Driving Alliance could not find any current campaigns that informed people about safe winter driving and the importance of winter vehicle maintenance.

The Shift Into Winter Campaign concentrates heavily on advertising. The main focus is on radio, print media, social media, and community events. Throughout the past 7 years they have conducted online surveys to track the success of the campaign. In doing so, they are able to justify expanding their funding.

Since they implemented advertising in Northwest BC there has been a great uptake of their brand. When advertising was first implemented in Northwest BC last year 42% of people across the province recalled the campaign as compared to 28% the year prior.

On the Shift Into Winter website, shiftintowinter.ca, there is a campaign tool kit that is free to the public. There is also an array of posters and pamphlets that can be printed out.

Mayor Leclerc thanked Mr. Gunn for his presentation and advised that the matter would be further dealt with under the "Correspondence" portion of this meeting's Agenda (See Resolution No. 352).
