### **DELEGATIONS & GUESTS:**

**REGULAR MEETING:** 

Matt Hulse, BC Campaign Director, Our Horizon – Introduction to Our Horizon Matt Hulse, BC Campaign Director for Our Horizon, introduced himself.

Mr. Hulse requested Council's support in putting forward a resolution to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities Annual Convention to require gas stations in British Columbia to label their gas pumps with warning labels about emissions and greenhouse gas use. He also requested that the City of Terrace consider a bylaw that requires all local gas station owners to put warning labels on their gas pumps.

One issue with carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) emissions and that people do not associate a cause with an effect because the effect is not immediately visible and is accumulative. Furthermore, because it is a global issue and not an issue of a few individuals, people tend to worry less about their personal impacts. These warning labels would act as a reminder for people every time they fuel up a vehicle in hopes of starting a conversation and changing people's thoughts on global warming.

There are also externalities associated with the cost of fossil fuel use that are not included in the price of fuel. These externalities (health and respiratory issues, infrastructure developments to deal with changing sea levels or storm fluctuations) can be identified on these warning labels.

The idea stemmed from the use of warning labels on cigarette packages.

Mayor Leclerc thanked Mr. Hulse for his presentation and advised the matter would be further dealt with under the "Correspondence" portion of this meeting's Agenda (See Resolution Nos. 305 and 306).
