MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING HELD IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL CHAMBERS ON MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 2016 AT 7:30 P.M.

Mayor C. Leclerc presided. Councillors present were L. Christiansen, J. Cordeiro (via telephone), B. Downie, M. Prevost, and S. Tyers. Councillor S. Bujtas was absent. Also in attendance were H. Avison, Chief Administrative Officer, D. Block, Director of Development Services, T. Irwin, City Planner, P. Proteau, Financial Administrator, A. Thompson, Clerk, and L. Wilson, Executive Assistant.

MOVE TO IN-CAMERA SPECIAL COUNCIL:

Meeting Called to Order at 6:30 p.m. – Move to In-Camera Special Council

Mayor Leclerc advised that Council agendas and minutes are available for viewing on the City's home page at <u>www.terrace.ca</u> and that Council meetings are webcast on the City's website and the past minutes have been archived.

DELEGATIONS & GUESTS:

Leslie Ann Wirth, Executive Director, PacificSport Northern B.C. – Advancing Sport Participation and Excellence in Northern B.C. *Ms.* Wirth presented on behalf of the PacificSport Northern B.C.

PacificSport Northern BC was incorporated in 1994 and has a mandate to improve physical literacy skills, increase physical activity levels, and provide specialized training services to young athletes on a performance pathway. Funding sources include viaSport, Province of British Columbia, City of Prince George and the 2015 Canada Games Legacy Fund. In October the organization will rebrand as Engage Sport North. PacificSport Northern BC operates out of facilities in Prince George and Fort St. John. They are the sole provider of high performance services for athletes and coaches in a multi-sport environment in Northern B.C. Engage Sport North is the northern delivery arm of the viaSport Regional Alliance, whose goal is to ensure that all BC residents have access to quality and relevant sport and physical activity opportunities. Engage Sport North has partnered with Northern Sport Accessibility Initiative to provide with physical, cognitive, and sensory people challenges with increased support and opportunity to participate in sport.

Engage Sport North's vision is to be acknowledged as a Provincial and National leader in development and enhancements of sport and physical literacy in all communities across Northern BC. Their mission is to provide high quality resources and services to athletes, coaches and community leaders through leadership, education and training to support active lifestyles along the Canadian Sport for Life (CS4L) pathway. The strategic directions are Programming Excellence, Sustainability, and Organizational Excellence.

The core areas of program delivery are sport participation, performance services, and sport development. In 2015/16 2,884 participants took part in activities sponsored by Engage Sport North. 524 athletes took part in performance services including UNBC Varsity teams. 25% of the gold medals won by Team BC at the Canada Winter Games were earned by PacificSport Northern BC Athletes. Sport development programs also saw more than 300 coaches, officials, and sport leaders.

Engage Sport North is promoting its Terrace Performance and Development Camp on October 14-16, 2016 in Terrace, B.C. The event includes introduction to coaching training, youth athlete physical testing, and individual athlete and coach strength and conditioning and mental training consultations. Ms. Wirth requested that the City promote the event to all of the local sports clubs and organizations in Terrace.

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Mayor Leclerc thanked Ms. Wirth for her presentation and advised that the matter would be further discussed under Correspondence. (See Resolution No. 366).

Ms. Loggin presented on behalf of the Terrace Downtown Improvement Area (TDIA) Society. She introduced Board members Debbie Letawski and Bruno Belanger, as well as Dennis Lissimore, Executive Director.

TDIA has been in operating in Terrace since 2012, after the approval of the City of Terrace Business Improvement Area (BIA) bylaw. The western boundary is Eby Street going east to Apsley Street, north to Davis Street and south to Greig Avenue, including the old Co-op Lands and George Little House.

TDIA has several focus areas: beautification, infrastructure, events, marketing, networking, and safety, support, and security. They have installed hanging baskets, planters and pocket gardens around the city. They have completed a tree inventory and some tree planting, and have ongoing downtown clean-up projects. They have invested over \$4,000 beautification with cost in sharing to local businesses, and partnering with the City of Terrace, Greater Terrace Beautification Society, and the Chamber of Commerce. They manage a facade improvement program with 15 projects completed in the last two years, totalling \$80,000.

TDIA host two main events annually. The Street Fair Medley, which takes place during Riverboat Days, and the Festival of Lights, which takes place in early December. TDIA has invested over \$9,000 in the past 3 years, and received a donation of \$1,000 from the Terrace Community Foundation. Some new events that were introduced in the downtown included the Brolly Square Buskers series and some block parties.

Sasa Loggin, Terrace Downtown Improvement Area – Request to Renew Bylaw No. 1982-2011 TDIA cost shares for radio and newspaper ads, including the "Go Downtown" Christmas promotion and "Go Downtown" newsletters. They run a Go Downtown Facebook page, and are a Champion of Love Terrace. Their networking includes workshops and webinars as well as presentations by local professionals. TDIA also has informal weekly meetings that are open to all members.

TDIA is seeking to have the BIA bylaw renewed for another 5 year term. As part of the bylaw, a levy is collected by the City on the properties within the TDIA and that levy is then passed along to TDIA for their work.

The request for the renewal of the Bylaw included possible boundary extensions to the east to include businesses beyond Apsley Street.

Mayor Leclerc thanked Ms. Loggin for her presentation and advised that the matter would be further dealt with under Correspondence. (See Resolution No. 367).

Ms. Moen presented on behalf of the 100th Celebration Committee.

The 100th Celebration Committee has organized several events in the past few years and is seeking assistance and approval to organize celebrations for Canada's 150th birthday.

Ms. Moen introduced Elaine Kempel, Leonard Lindstrom, and Debbie Letawski, who are all members of the 100th Celebration Committee.

There are three ongoing projects for 2016. The first is a war time memorial at the Northwest Regional Airport. The gun range backstop (called the bunker) at the airport now includes a propeller and a picnic table. There are also plans to have a mural added to the site. The second bunker is located near the Duncan Kerr Ball Park. The third project for 2016 is the placement of a memorial sign at the Mile 28 avalanche site.

Yvonne Moen, 100th Celebration Committee – Update on Committee Activities

The Committee has been in contact with the Dumont family and the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure regarding this sign.

Ms. Moen stated that funding was still available through the Canada 150 fund for grants for activities. The deadline for applications is October 21st.

The Committee is seeking support from the City to carry on with the projects above.

Mayor Leclerc thanked Ms. Moen for her presentation and advised that the matter would be further dealt with under Correspondence. (See Resolution No. 368).

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1. TEMPORARY LIQUOR LICENSE AMENDMENT APPLICATION (EXTENSION OF HOURS OCTOBER 1, 2016) – BOSTON PIZZA SPORTS BAR

It was recommended that Council pass the following resolution opposing the temporary change to hours of sale for Boston Pizza Sports Bars (Terrace) for the hosting of an awards evening on October 1, 2016:

Be it resolved that:

- 1. The City of Terrace Council does not support the "temporary" amendment of the subject license for October 1, 2016 as:
 - a) The application is for a temporary extension of operating hours (4924 Highway 16 West) during a special event and the allotted time frame of 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 a.m.;
 - b) The R.C.M.P. opposes the granting of the temporary extension of licensed operating hours due to concerns of potential negative impact on the community, and issues of limited staffing complement and capacity.
- 2. The Council's comments the prescribed on considerations are as follows:
 - a) a) The potential for noise if the application is approved would likely be negligible as it is in an existing establishment in a commercial area; and
 - b) b) The overall impact on the community if the application is approved may however prove to be negative.
- 3. The views of the residents were not gathered for this application because:
 - a) City of Terrace Policy No. 83 Liquor License Application Process does not require a public notice and hearing for temporary applications.

2. DEVELOPMENT VARIANCE PERMIT NO. 14-2016 – RITCHEY (4305 LAKELSE AVENUE)

It was recommended that the City issue Development Variance Permit No. 14-2016 for the property located at 4305 Lakelse Avenue (PRS348, District Lot 368, Range 5, Coast District), for the following variances:
