DELEGATIONS & GUESTS:

Amanda Bains, Ksan Society

– Ksan House Society

Amanda Bains from the Ksan Society introduced herself.

Ksan Society has been providing social service programs to Terrace and the surrounding area since 1979. Ksan Society offers several programs to the community, all of which are free and provide a range of supports for individuals fleeing abuse, those experiencing homelessness, or are otherwise disadvantaged. These programs include:

- Ksan House Terrace Transition House;
- Community Based Victim Services program;
- Sexual Assault Response program;

- Stopping the Violence Women's Counsellor and Outreach program;
- Exploring Healthy Relationships program;
- Donation Room and Furniture Shed;
- Pet Program;
- Ksan Residence and Shelter;
- Ksan Extreme Weather Shelter;
- Homelessness Prevention Program;
- Skeena Kalum Housing; and
- ➤ Ksan Place A Southside Community Place.

Program locations include the Ksan Administration Building and Transition House on Lazelle Avenue, the Ksan Residence and Shelter on Hall Street, and Ksan Place which is located behind the shelter.

Ksan Society's Skeena Kalum Housing project is a 50 unit social housing complex on Terrace's south side. The units are subsidized by BC Housing and ensure that tenants do not pay more than 30% of their income on rent. The housing complex provides a mixture of one, two, three, and four bedroom apartments, as well as market rental units.

Ksan Place offers a commercial standard kitchen, large multi-purpose room (seating for 50), and a smaller group room. Ksan Place acts as a hub for activities that assist in developing healthy lifestyles that include balanced physical, emotional, intellectual, and social development.

Ms. Bains introduced Greer Kaiser, Ksan Society Chair, who reviewed the Society's most recent activities, including the purchase of a property next door to their current Lazelle Avenue property, and the Society's plans to determining the best possible use for that property.

Tracey Davidson, Restorative Justice Program – Update on Restorative Justice Program

Tracey Davidson from the Restorative Justice Program introduced herself and thanked Council for the opportunity to present.

Ms. Davidson provided a definition of Restorative

Justice and showed a video regarding the Restorative Justice process. 23 individuals in total have been trained as facilitators in Terrace. Ms. Davidson extended an invitation to the public to join a Provincial Restorative Justice Steering Committee, and highlighted the importance of the Restorative Justice program in our region.

Mayor Leclerc thanked Ms. Davidson for her presentation advised the matter would be further dealt with under the "Correspondence" portion of the meeting's agenda (See Resolution No. 492)

Robert Grodecki, North Coast-Skeena First Nations Stewardship Society – Howe Creek Habitat Inventory and Assessment Work Mr. Grodecki from the North Coast-Skeena First Nations Stewardship Society introduced himself. The North Coast-Skeena First Nations Stewardship Society (NCSFNSS) was established in 2005 as a Non-Profit Society. Member Nations include Kitselas, Kitsumkalum, Metlakatla, Gitxaala, Gitga'at, and the Haisla Nation for specific projects. NCSFNSS's activities primarily include Marine Use Planning, Fisheries Policy, Management, and Research.

Recently, the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) created a Fish Habitat Restoration Fund which makes funding available to individual First Nations and aggregate First Nation groups, within certain criteria for protecting and/or enhancing salmon habitat. The NCSFNSS Board of Directors approved a staff recommendation to seek funds from the Fish Habitat Restoration Initiative program, to support work within the Northwest region in partnership with Local Governments.

Previous development activities within the Terrace municipal boundary have left the outlet of Howe Creek perched high above the Skeena River, hindering adult Coho migration into the creek except during rare extreme flood events. Fisheries & Oceans Canada Resource Restoration Unit has identified this area as an excellent potential for effective fish habitat restoration, NCSFNSS would like to develop fish habitat and commission а restoration assessment and inventory project at Howe Creek. The project would consist of a field investigation to assess the potential for the restoration of adult COHO salmon access to Howe Creek. The project would be funded by NCSFNSS and the Fisheries &

Oceans Canada Fish Habitat Restoration Initiative (FHRI) program. The proposed project would involve assessment and inventory work at no cost to the City of Terrace and will not require the allocation of City staff resources. NCSFNSS believes that this project aligns with other fish habitat stewardship activities supported by the City and residents of Terrace.

Mr. Grodecki asked the City to provide a letter of support for this project to use with NCSFNSS's funding proposal to Fisheries and Oceans Canada.
